- 1. What literally bothers Grendel about the ram on the first two pages of chapter 1? Now, what metaphorically bothers him about the ram (why is he REALLY upset?)?
- 2. How does Grendel consider himself better than the ram and the other animals in the forest?
- 3. Why does Grendel call his war "idiotic" (Gardner 5)?
- 4. Why is Grendel so upset with the religious rituals (14)? What do they have in common with the ram?

Chapter 2:

- 1. Describe Grendel's interaction with the bull (bottom of 19-22): what does this reveal about Grendel's character?
- 2. What does Grendel realize on page 22? How does his realization develop his character? How do you interpret this revelation?
- 3. What characterizes Grendel's first meeting with the humans (23-27)? How old is he here? What surprises you about their reaction?

4. How is Grendel's mother portrayed? How does that compare with your expectations?

- 1. How does human society appear through Grendel's eyes? (32)
- 2. What effect does the Shaper have? How? (34)
- 3. Why is it "incredible" to Grendel that he may be related to men? (36)

- 4. (90: re-read this page) What do you make of Unferth falling asleep in the lair and not being able to fight Grendel? Why is Unferth bitter now?
- 5. How is this Unferth different from the one who challenges Beowulf in the original poem? Why would Gardner have identified him that way?

- 2. Why is Hrothulf in this novel?

- **3.** Explain Ork's idea that "beauty requires contrast." (133)
